LINDA BROWN (1942-2018)

At the center of the landmark Supreme Court case that overturned legalized segregation in American schools, Linda Brown of Topeka, KS died March 25th at the age of 76. Filmmaker Sarah Mondale — director of *Backpack Full of Cash* — had the honor of interviewing her in 1995 for our PBS series *SCHOOL: The Story of American Public Education*, narrated by Meryl Streep.
